



BIPARTISAN GERRYMANDERING FRAMEWORK STATISTICS

More than 80% of both Republican and Democratic voters support requiring every state to use independent redistricting commissions.

From 1962 to 2020, partisan mid-decade congressional redistricting occurred only twice. Since 2020, it has occurred in 10 states and is underway in additional states.

71% of Americans believe states should not be allowed to draw congressional districts that intentionally favor one political party.

There are less than half as many competitive congressional districts today as there were in the 1990s.

The 10 most bipartisan Members of Congress all represent districts with a Cook PVI within five points. As competitive districts disappear, so do incentives for bipartisan representation.

Only 16% of voters believe that federal districts are being drawn fairly.

45% of voters identify as independents. In many states, they cannot participate in partisan primaries and are often the most affected by increasingly partisan redistricting.

More than three-quarters of voters support a redistricting process that prioritizes communities over political advantage (78%) and favor having independent commissions draw congressional districts (77%).

The Problem Solvers Caucus remains committed to pursuing bipartisan reforms that strengthen public confidence in congressional representation and reduce incentives for partisan conflict in the redistricting process.
